Presidents Report

On Saturday, 19th November, a small group of five met to conduct a reptile survey of 8 specific areas across the Wetlands, Red Gum and Heathland environments. This is the third year of the surveys being conducted by the Victorian Field Naturalists with the input and support of the Parks Victoria and the Friends of Braeside Park. I was wearing two hats – Friends and as a member of the Field Naturalists. It was a beautiful day and we set off, led by Robin Drury (Field Naturalists) hopeful of finding many reptiles. Because of the wonderfully wet spring rain, finding the tiles and iron sheets was difficult.



Originally the areas were set up with four sheets of corrugated roofing iron at each corner and in between were 16 roofing tiles laid out in a square pattern. Over the years, the tiles have often been moved or disappeared into the grasses or subsided into the wetlands. Let us say most were found! Then it is lifting carefully to see what lies beneath and always remembering that some of the inhabitants of Braeside Park are not very keen on voyeurs inspecting their homes. The group found skinks, snakes, Jacky lizards and many ant and mouse nests, beetles and larva. The skink species found were the Delicate, Garden, Weasel and Bougainville. Two copper head snakes were found - one over a metre and one juvenile. Neither were interested in leaving their roof sheeting home.

I also have joined Jessica and Des

(Ranger) on a couple of time in the last month to survey frogs – called Frog Watch but which is really Frog Listen. Using Melbourne Water's Frog Watch app., the Friends Group has recorded the frogs at 10 places in the park. The app tapes and uploads and gives a report all within 24 hours – fantastic. If

you want to join us at approximately 0330, please let Des know. YES, I did say 3:30 am in the morning. It is a great way to start the day — watching the dawn break and listening to the bird chorus and of course, the frogs! We encounter a few early morning riders and joggers too!

These are all important parts of the Friends' group activities. Knowing what is in the park can help to establish what we need to cater for and to protect and to educate others about. It is also the reason for many joining the Group – to learn more about the natural world and especially our Park.

THE GREAT INSECT DAY/NIGHT EVENT

Saturday, 25th November, a small group of excited children and adults congregated in the Braeside Park's Visitors' Centre waiting for the insect hunt to begin. The Entomology Society of Victoria had contacted the Friends' Group to ask if they could have a

day and night insect hunt to wet their appetite for their Melbourne three-day conference. Twenty-three persons started a slow meander down the path to the little pond, stopping every few metres to share finds of moths, butterflies, beetles, dragon flies hover flies and ants. It is amazing what is to be found. The time flew by and soon it was 5:30 pm and the members headed back

to begin their BBQ dinner and children went home with an increased appreciation for the bugs in their back yards. At 6:30 pm, a small procession of cars headed off in to the Heathland to set up the "sheets" with lights powered by



portable generators for the "moth" hunt. At about 8:45 pm the generators began and the sheets lit up the small tracks and the entomological members began hovering around the sheets in anticipation. The first moths arrived small and tentative but soon they were joined by awkward crane flies and beautiful green moths and larger moths. Some settled and some kept on walking

while the members tried to photograph all arrivals. I really was in awe of the ability of the members to rattle off the names of most moths.

By 8 pm, one small Prep boy had had enough and decided to go home and one generator packed up and the owner also went home. However, the others stayed till 11:30 pm until the fuel for a generator ran out and as luck would have it, the wind dropped completely out which is the best time for photographing moths.

Then there was a general pack up and by 12:45 am I dropped into bed with moths in my dreams. The entomologist would like to return in Summer and we would welcome them back as they add another layer of knowledge about our Park.





The date for moth and insect hunt will be advertised on our website. While all this exciting event was happening, a man decided to release a couple of ring-tailed possums into the park! Firstly, possums are protected Australian animals and it is illegal to capture them and this the man knew as he quickly exited the car park when approached by some members of the public. Secondly, by releasing the possums in the park he is condemning them to death as the Park has resident possums who do not accept any new possums.

Luckily, the people who were trying to stop him were in fact Wild Life Carers who captured the Ring-Tailed Possum and he/she will be cared for until the carers allow him/her to leave and live on their property. I have enormous respect for Wild Life Carers who spent their own money and time caring for wounded and sick wildlife. Where would we be without them!

Coastal Flax-lily Dianella sp. aff. revoluta (Coastal)

Coastal Flax-lily is a long-lived, rhizomatous perennial herb that can form large spreading colonies. The arching green leaves grow to 65 cm long and 5-12 mm wide, with a reddish base and flattish to slightly revolute (rolled under) margins. Blue to violet flowers to 20 mm wide have yellow filament swellings and dark brown

to black anthers. They are in panicles generally held above the foliage and flower from October to January. Flowers are followed by an ovoid, deep bluish succulent berry, with shiny black seeds. The Dianella genus is undergoing a revision with several species separated from Dianella revoluta, including Coastal Flax-lily. It is an exclusively coastal species and grows extensively at Venus Bay. Dianella brevicaulis is another now separate coastal spe-

cies with flower stems only up to 15 cm long, not exceeding the foliage.

Once Coastal Flax-lily is established it is very hardy, being both drought and frost resistant. It provides long periods of interest in the garden with its compact, clumping and evergreen foliage. It prefers a well-drained soil and accepts part or full shade. It looks best in mass planting and makes a decorative understorey plant while adding tex-

ture. Birds, including parrots, are attracted by the berries. The strappy leaves were used in basket and cord making by Aborigines, the roots were cooked and the fruit used for dyeing. Propagation is from seed or division of rhizomes.

The genus *Dianella* has recently changed to the Asphodelaceae or Aloe family. *Dianella* is named from *Diana* the Roman Goddess of the hunt; 'ella' being small. *Revoluta* refers to the inrolled leaf margins.
