President's Report

It has been a long hot summer. Braeside Park seems to have survived better that most places.

As I walk through in the early morning, I have encountered blue tongue lizards, echidnas and long necked turtles. I also saw Freckled Ducks, Blue Billed ducks and I think Shovelers and Hard Head Ducks on the wetlands. The White Faced Herons seem to find sustenance in the fast disappearing creeks ponds and does not seem too worried if I stop and watch his feeding. The many campervans and caravans also seem oblivious of my stopping and watching them in our carparks.

However, what I did not see was the usual abundance of butterflies. They seemed to have also disappeared from my own garden. Even at night. I have only seen the occasional moth fluttering near the window. I asked a friend who specialises in Terrestrial invertebrates and he said there has been a major collapse in insect numbers.

This is quite worrying when the Mordialloc Freeway seems unstoppable. The Environment Effects Survey (EES) has been completed and submissions from many individuals and groups worried of the consequences of the building have been made. However, the dateline for the building has been widely advertised even before the verbal submissions are presented to the Panel. This is possibly a political ploy to suggest to the public opposing the Freeway you have not power to stop or change this construction.

The Friends of Braeside Park are gearing up for another year of Nocturnal Walks, Cleaning Up Australia activities, Spring and Senior Walks and celebrating 30 years of volunteering. Surveys were sent out and I hope that everyone makes an effort to return the completed questions.

It seems ironic that the Friends should also have to fight for mitigating the effects of a Freeway right on our Park's boundary. That word "mitigating" is a key word used in the EES. It suggests that the effects of the lighting, sound and dust and the impact of building roads across previous waterways for the building a 6 lane Freeway at the bottom of the Park can be controlled. Planting more trees will solve the loss of other trees.

The dead fish in the Murray-Darling River system seem to have no impact on the State's politicians. We will try to inform the Panel that the Freeway next to Braeside Park is not needed .

2019 Night Walk Program

The Friends night walk program will once again be operating in 2019 with expected bookings via 2 methods – text/phone to 0417 323 460 or email to <u>braesideparkfriends@gmail.com</u>. The dates are April (to be determined add when available), 3 May, 7 June, 5 July, 2 August, and 6 September. We take a maximum of 15 to 20 people per walk only for safety reasons and to ensure that the animals can be sighted in a quiet and welcoming environment. Sturdy shoes and appropriate clothing are essential, with a gold coin donation to the friends.

With large group bookings we will need confirmation 48 hours before at the latest so the spaces can be filled, and appreciate minimal torches on these walks so we can use our infra red torches to spot the animals in their home environment. We leave at 7.00 pm sharp, and return around 8.30 pm. Departure point will be advertised on website and flyers around the park. We do not take pushers/prams and parents need to supervise their children on the walks.

Park Activities (cont.)

Racecourse Walk 27 January 2018, and earlier

Members of the Friends of Braeside Park and the Dingley Village Mens' Shed, with the Ranger Team Leader, Des Lucas, as our host, took part in a walk around the racecourse trail at Braeside to celebrate the history of horse racing at Braeside from the 1920's to the 1960's with an appreciative audience and plenty of information changing hands on this walk.

We looked at the history of this important project, developed over 12 years to celebrate the achievements of the doyen of the track Phar Lap in the 1920's and 30's. Many visitors to the park run and walk along the race course without appreciating the historical significance of horse racing in the sandbelt district from the 1880's to the closure in 1998. Many residents of the racecourse estate in Mentone or Richfield Village/ or Aspendale do not realise the significant contribution that many trainers made to the environmental history of the area in this time.

I am often asked where were these racecourses and how popular were they? As the grand daughter of a local well known bookmaker I am aware of the significance and the fact that these locations were developed for housing and their history not recorded. This is an opportunity to develop this with the Phar Lap project at Braeside Park with a rich and varied race history. Please see historical article on Eric Wilmott if you are interested.

Where were these racecourses you ask?

Braeside Park training track 2 tracks sand and made track; Mentone (opposite the Thrift Park) Aspendale (named after the horse Aspen), Epsom at Mordialloc (McDonald Street) now the Epsom Estate with 450 houses. The Tote Box has been saved in some form as a reminder with some modifications. The final one is Richfield (with street names of racing identities), a retirement village on Wells Roads, Aspendale Gardens. The punters often walked back to the station penniless after a bad day but it is an era sadly gone and forgotten. More on horse racing in the next edition of this newsletter.

Historical article—Eric John Wilmott Horse trainer Braeside Park

While Harry Telford, the trainer of Phar Lap is better known there was other trainers in Braeside over its history that were also successful. One of these was Eric John Wilmott, who moved to Braeside in 1940 from Mentone, having originally lived in Berwick like other well known trainers.

Eric leased the Braeside property from the Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works from 1940 to 1955, to difficult time with World War Ii and Australia under threat. The soil/ track must have been very suitable for horse training and close to the racecourses as very well known people asked Eric to train their horses there, at one time up to 30 horses. His own horses apparently did not do so well.. It is said that photos of race finishes and horses trained by Ernie lined the walls of his homestead. The favourite was Don Pedro the winner of the 1947 Moonee Valley Cup. Ernie's wife Eleanor looked after the many visitors to Braeside with several people living on the property. The cooking and cleaning, was done also the meals for boys and clothes for race day. She is said to have fed 14 people each day. In the article, their daughter Shirley Morgan records an idyllic childhood and a time long forgotten. EJ prepared his jockeys well and Shirley observes that "He was a very good judge of horses. I could tell whether a horse could win by the way my father reacted. He didn't say anything but there was a confidence in his behavior."
