From the President

The first Committee Meeting brought together many concerns and plans.

This first half of the year will see the departure of all our experienced Parks Victoria staff. Ranger Andrew has begun a new posting closer to home; Ranger Kelly has also departed for a new posting and Rangers Des and Digger are going on long service in April – May with a view to retiring afterwards. That cleans out all the "old" experienced staff and the process to recruit new staff in under way, but this will take time.

This leaves our A Team (Wednesday Park Volunteers) in limbo with no Ranger co-ordinator but a list of tasks possible if a few arrive. Considering once this Group was a vibrant incredibly productive team working 3 hours weekly per volunteer of weeding, guard removal, planting and general dog's body tasks. It was quite a social group with a morning tea break pre-Covid.

Most volunteers felt a great sense of achievement and slight exhaustion at the end of Wednesday mornings. Hopefully, the new staff will be willing to revive the A Team.

The Nursery Revegetation Program started on Sunday 20 February 2022 after the Covid relapse. Ranger Des has rejuvenated the process and hopes that the new recruits will be motivated to stay. The Nursery will be from 9-12 on the first Saturday, third Sunday and first Tuesday of the month. The A-Team will work in the Nursery on the first Tuesday of the month. Here's hoping for a new beginning.

The Phar Lap Project and the Cypress Tree Chain Saw Carvings Program are back on the Friends' yearly Agenda but with the imminent departure of Rangers Des and Digger, now is the time to move these long-standing programs forward to fruition.

So 2022 is off and running with departures, plans and energy high.

Frank and Helen will begin community engagement with a Clean Up Australia activity in early March and Margaret has already taken Nocturnal Walk bookings which begin after Daylight Savings ends.

Friends' New Year Resolution is to get the Phar Lap Trail begun and maybe finished by 2022.

There are many opportunities in assisting with the night walk program, revegetation, Wednesday A team, park monitoring activities, and other projects in a number of areas. This is an opportunity to gain some on ground experience in tree planting, nursery work, tour guiding, and also to gain knowledge of Braeside Park and its environment.

Groups are managed with the assistance of the Parks Victoria rangers, and recognition is provided with increasing your knowledge and skills in these areas.

As a group over 30 years old, we are always looking for new people to be involved in our activities, and who have an interest in Braeside Park. A volunteer activity day is planned for Saturday 19th March at the information centre. Night Walk Program 2022

The night walk program is starting on Friday 8 April 2022 after the finish of daylight saving in Victoria. Walks leave from the Visitor Center Carpark at 7.00 pm sharp, with sturdy footwear, and warm clothing required. Closed in shoes are required, and all walkers are required to be fully vaccinated under Parks Victoria guidelines.

Bookings will be taken from 13 March 2022, with numbers limited and all bookings confirmed before the walk. A walk will be cancelled if the weather conditions are deemed unsafe. Bookings will be notified if a cancellation occurs.



Braeside Park Bird Surveys

The January 2022 survey had to be cancelled because of a weather forecast of big winds and thunderstorms but the February survey went ahead in spite of access difficulties such that only eight of the ten survey sites were able to be covered. One team did four heathland sites and the other, one heathland and three woodland. The survey sites were all very dry with little evidence of blossom so both insect and nectar food sources would be low. In spite of this, there were a good number of bush birds around.

The heathland team came back bubbling with excitement over the number of small birds they had seen - many Spotted Pardalotes, White-browed Scrubwrens, Grey Fantails, and both New Holland and White-plumed Honeyeaters. They had good numbers of both Red and Little Wattlebirds and had also seen a large raptor on the wing which, from their descriptions, was most probably a Little Eagle - a species which has been recorded previously on several occasions in the Park on the bird surveys.

Sadly, the woodland team found their areas heavily overpopulated with Noisy Miners with several birds indicating they were still nesting and others being chased by noisy fledglings. Parrots were plentiful, both Eastern Rosellas and Red-rumped: Sulphur-crested Cockatoos were common but, surprisingly, no Galahs. Both White-faced Heron and Straw-necked Ibis were recorded over the woodland; and a small number of Crested Pigeons and Common Bronzewings were also seen.

Both teams recorded Tawny Frogmouths; one was found close to the entrance to the heathlands and three just north of the Redgum Picnic area.

The March survey will be on the fourth Friday of the month as usual, (March 25th) but, in order to avoid Easter and Anzac weekends, the April survey will be on the fifth Friday (April 29th).

- TEMPERATURE Measures the average temperature of the water, which affects the chemical changes in water and affects survival of aquatic life.
- pH Measures the alkalinity or acidity of the water, which affect the survival of aquatic life.
- ELECTRICAL CONDUCTIVITY Measures the amount of dissolved salts in the water (salinity level). Salinity affects the survival of aquatic life.
- TURBIDITY Measures the clarity of the water (relates to the amount of suspended particles), which affects the survival of aquatic life.
- FLOW VELOCITY/RATE Measures the stream volume and speed of water flow, which affects the survival of aquatic life.
- DISSOLVED OXYGEN (DO) Measures the amount of oxygen in the water, which is essential for the survival of most organisms and aquatic plants.
- REACTIVE PHOSPHATE- Measures the amount of phosphorus in the water, an indicator of the nutrient status, organic enrichment and subsequent health of the water body.
- AMMONIUM- Measures the amount of ammonium (a form of nitrogen) in the water, which indicates organic enrichment and subsequent enrichment of the water body.



Revegetation Program

On Sunday morning the 20th February, Ranger Des along with Judith (President - Friends of Braeside Park), Claudia, Vicky, Denyse, Jane, Jean, Isobel, Penny, attended the Park Community Nursery to commence the reinvigorate work for the vegetation program.

The tasks undertaken included the removal of thistles and general weeds, raking of car park and paths and utilising the removed leaf matter for mulch, cleaning out the large shed, sweeping and tiding up to make the shed functional again. The fridge also was given a big clean-out and some of the seedlings were moved from the igloo to the shade house.

Everyone shared a good chat over a cuppa and also a short walk to view a pair of tawny frog mouths near the Park Office.

Thank you everyone for your efforts and we look forward to the March sessions which are listed below.

Meaning of life and Friends of Braeside Park

I have been a member for a couple of years, and it is time to renew my membership.

So, what are the Benefits?

There are many activities that you can participate in.

You are invited to night walks in the park where I try to take photos of the night wildlife, not very successfully though. The aim is to catch the wildlife without using flash or bright lights which at times becomes a bit tricky but adds to the enjoyment of the night.

You get to experience the excitement of the kids that come along as they are shown the wildlife.

One special night (Bat Night) that was run by a Bat specialist who brought and setup special bat netting so we could catch some of the bats that fly around the park. The bats were all identified then released. Overall, that was a very educational and informative night.

Then there is the FOBP Facebook page where people post their photos of the various wildlife in the park. To me, it is very enjoyable to see the other birds and animals in the park, but it is also very frustrating because I have not been able to see, let alone photograph several of the species shown. Future challenges?

While walking around the park during the year you get to observe the various bird families as they develop (e.g., the Black Swan, the pink eared duck, the cormorants, and other varieties of birds). You occasionally get to see a raptor (which the local birds tell you all about with warnings).

You get to hear a lot of the small birds in the bushes and occasionally they sit on a branch long enough to allow you to get the camera in focus, but they dart off again before you can press the shutter.

The sad part about the park is the loss of rangers (due to retirement and promotions) which means that the maintenance will suffer (e.g., clearing paths, fire breaks, removing nonlocal flora). Rangers like Des provide support for the Friends of Braeside Park activities with guidance and suggested areas for improvement. FOBP also have input into the improvements in the park, so working with the rangers is very important. The other issue is the dying trees where the salt level in the ground water is rising, this needs to be addressed urgently otherwise no trees and ground cover, then no wildlife for people to observe.

So, what can you do to provide a happier atmosphere at the park, become involved with the various volunteer groups, make sure you clean-up after you? Be very proud of your park and show it to your friends and relatives as a local place to observe wildlife and have a relaxing picnic while the kids enjoy the various structures.



Even with these caveats, I have been able to photograph some of our inhabitants in their full glory during my morning walks.




