## **Committee News**

### STATE AND TERRITORY LAND AWARDS NOMINTATIONS

The Secretary of the Friends of Braeside Park has been nominated for the 2015 State and Territory Land Care Award.

Margaret Hunter's mother, a geography teacher in the 1950 and 1960s, meant that young Margaret visited many unspoilt environments from Wilsons Promontory to the Grampians so it was no wonder that she became passionate about preserving the environment. As a student of La Trobe University, Margaret built on her youthful experiences, completing a Graduate Diploma in Recreation at Preston Institute of Technology at Bundoora. She became involved in recreational activities around Bundoora including creating cross country tracks. Moving back to Mentone, Margaret became part of the Gould League's educational activities. As secretary and tour guide for 15 years of the Mordialloc and District Historical Society from 1983 to 2007, Margaret received a Centenary Medal from the Commonwealth Government for her community work in 2003.

Many would have considered this their life's achievement, but not Margaret who having moved opposite the Epsom Race Track, as it was closing, saw the need to campaign to save the remaining landscape of the former racecourse, by preserving the large gum trees, tote box and the rare grassland area. She represented the community group on a panel which was successful and incidentally formed the Friends of Epsom Grasslands to maintain this area within the Kingston Friend's network.

Margaret also saw the need to preserve and protect the RAMSAR Wetlands at Edithvale and Seaford so became secretary of the Friends of Edithvale-Seaford which meant regularly involvement in community events, walks around the wetlands, administration and management of the grant program, writing a tour guide of the Edithvale wetlands, working with the Melbourne Water to develop programs at the Edithvale-Seaford Education Centre, assisting with Coast Care/Summer by the Sea activities.

She sits on Kingston Climate Change and Bio-Diversity Reference Group and is secretary of the Friends of Braeside Park and in her spare time, Margaret volunteers at major international sports events!

This is the Green Army team, who are working in the park for six months, assisting with habitat restoration and biodiversity improvement.

The Green Army is a federal government program, where teams of young people (17-24) work with a supervisor on specific environmental projects. Along with gaining practical experience, the young people in the program receive a first aid certificate and industry-based training, which will assist in their future career prospects.

The team at Braeside Park are working on a number of tasks across the park, including weed control, propagation, fencing and tree guard removal, and enjoy the support of Parks Victoria and Conservation Volunteers in delivering these projects.

#### Night walks in June at Braeside Park

The Friends have been involved in two night walks at Braeside in June with varying conditions and sightings. These have been delivered by Judith Sise, Margaret Hunter and Frank Russo. Night walks are now an integral part of the friend's activity program, with the use of the friend's infra-red night vision torches which enables good viewing of the nocturnal animals of Braeside including rabbits. Foxes, doves, many possums and sulphur crested cockatoos. A sugar glider was sighted on a recent walk near the heathland.

On 4 June, in extremely cold and often wet weather in the afternoon, the Beaumaris Scout troop of 13 members and families including the Kookaburra, Jenny had a night walk noted for few sightings, and fast walking due to the cold and misty weather conditions. The main sightings were the possums that abound in some areas of the park, and a couple of rabbits. It was still an enjoyable night with the highlight being the enjoyment of an important scout activity in a natural area. The scouts appreciated the bush environment and enjoyed the opportunity to learn about Braeside Park

On 5 June, 21 people and two friend's guides, Judith and Margaret, took a mixed group of adults and children around a park circuit in much milder conditions. We started with a sighting of rabbits and an obliging ring-tail possum sitting expectedly in a tree in the car park happily munching leaves, waiting for a captive audience and an infra-red light to be the star attraction at the start of the walk.



The kids loved it. On further exploration we were able, with the assistance of members of the group to see a dove, sulphur crested cockatoos, a tawny frog mouth, sugar glider, more possums and other rabbits, as well as the purple swamp hens at the duck pond. We explored the red gum trail with sightings of a tawny frog mouth, and other animals. We had a successful night, with a repeat booking for July, and the promise of more sightings and explorations of other routes for future walks.

## **Park Report**

There is not a lot to report our the last few months but the commencement and bedding in of the Green Army Group now has them working on a number of tasks.

One of these tasks the removal of tree guard throughout the whole park. This has never been undertaken before and its anticipated that it will take a further few months to complete it. The recycling of the frames and guards means that the parks stocks have been bolstered although a number needed to be thrown away as they could not be used again.

A further project has been to assist with the revegetation program. This has required the group to learn about seed collection, sowing seeds, cuttings and details about native plants of the park. The first of the plants from the group will be pricked out in preparation for planting in the coming weeks.

Whilst out and about I've manage to get a few interesting photographs. The first on this page is of some fungi and the second is of the Braeside Wetland at sunrise in June this year on page 13.



## **Bird Report**

As reported by Margaret & Ian Langdon, Steve McDonald and park staff.

Significant birds observed over the last few months by Steve McDonald include Hobby Hawk, Australian Bittern, Male and Female Scarlett Robins, Wedge Tailed Eagle, Mistletoe Birds, Red Kneed Dotterel, Flame Robins and the White Bellied Sea Eagle.
