Friends Nightwalk Program Report

The Friends of Braeside Park run very successful night walks to view the nocturnal animals of Braeside Park, which is an activity enjoyed by a large number of families over the last two years, with many bookings and requests for special walks received by the friends group.

Committee members of the friends run these walks as a voluntary activity on a monthly basis with the walks leaving from the visitor centre carpark at 7.00 pm sharp. We advise arrival at 6.45 pm to 6.50 pm, with appropriate clothing, and closed footwear. The Friends provide some infra red torches and spotlights, for these walks which take a different route in the park on most occasions so that the animals spotted are different each time.

It is also an important monitoring activity for the park rangers, and the sightings of the night animals are all recorded on a map so that communities of nocturnal animals can be recorded. This provides information on the park which is essential for park management, and development, and trail management.

Bookings for these night walks are through the email address:- braesideparkfriends@gmail.com with numbers capped at 20 for each walk. You can book ahead, with walks until the end of the non daylight saving season in September. Information is on our friends webpage also with special group bookings taken outside the monthly walks. April night walk

Our first night walk was held on Friday 8 April, the second Friday to accommodate daylight saving restrictions, and was attended by 20 people. Most were young families, and some adults, with a good mix of age groups and interests. To minimise noise and give better viewing of the animals we took alternate routes, with view of the cypress drive, the racecourse, and the many possums around the visitor centre, and Telford Picnic area, as well as the walk to the Cherry bridge. The group enjoyed the experience, and the animals obliged in good numbers including tawny frog mouths and doves on some occasions. We arrived back at the visitor centre carpark at around 8.30 pm, tired but elated at the abundant night life of the park.

May night walk

The May night was held on 6 May on a still warm night, with an attendance of 20 people, a good group for spotting nocturnal animals in the park. The possums obliged even in the visitor centre carpark, much to the delight of the children present and hung around for early arrivals for the walk.

We had a varied group of families and seniors, and split into two groups, with many sightings of foxes, possums, cats, doves, rabbits, the sulphur crested cockatoos who as always warned us of their presence, and others – the purple swamp hens at the duck pond and other ducks also welcomed us to the quiet surrounds of Braeside Park. The aircraft noise was not unusual and the animals were sleeping through this on a warm still night.

On the way back to the visitor centre near the playground, we were accompanied by an inquisitive brush-tailed possum on the ground who seemed to enjoy the opportunity to experience ground level walking much to the delight of both the children and adults present.

Thanks to Margaret, Judith, Frank and David for once again being volunteer guides for this activity, we need more, with training provided as required, so if you are interested please contact me on the email address braesideparkfriends@gmail.com

Park Report



Park Office:

Staff had a period of 3 weeks where they were locked out of the office. This occurred after it was noticed that the building was moving and concern was raised about whether the internal fit out of the building was safe when it was converted to an office back in the early 1990's. One of the internal brick walls had moved away from the building internal fit out material. A structural assessment was required along with an asbestos check as there is asbestos materials within the building. In the end the all clear was given and

Dogs:

Ranger staff have been speaking people waking dogs in the Park educating them about the NO DOG policy for the park. Rangers also receive lots of reports of people with dogs in the park after hours especially allowing them to roam free with out being controlled on a leash.

Wind damage:

The last week there has been lots of wind with many branches being blow from the trees, this can be seen as natures way of removing the dangerous

branches from the trees especially throughout the picnic areas.

Rabbits:

Rabbit baiting program has been delivered again with the rabbit number peaking at 52 rabbits per spotlight kilometre and after baiting now at 16, due to the funding levels this year the integrated rabbit program of fumigation and ripping of rabbit warrens has not been delivered. Hopefully an increase in funding will allow for this activity over the next year as its crucial reducing the rabbit numbers further.

Green Army:

The third session of the Green Army program is well underway with further plants being propagated, mulch spread and the planting program now well underway. So

far approximately 4000 plants have been planted.

Litter:

Litter has been a major issue for staff over the last year with general garden waste, mattresses, furniture, paling fences, garden waste etc being dumped regularly in the park. Precious time is spent by staff cleaning this up which means other duties within the park are just not being delivered.

Stump Art Project:

The next stump is just about to receive some sculpting work. The top stump near the men's shed will have a link to our racing history carved by Rob Bast. Its proposed that Pharlap, the 1930 Melbourne Cup and Tommy Woodcock be part of the stump art. We all look forward to the next phase of this art. Thank you to the Friends for providing the funds to carry out this task.



Bird Report

As reported by Margaret & Ian Langdon, Steve McDonald and park staff.



Margaret and Ian have completed 4 Wetland Surveys this year January to April with the following being the most observed species, Golden Headed Cisticola, European Golden Finch, Red Browed Finch, Superb Fairy Wren, Red Rump Parrot, Rainbow Lorikeet. Rock Dove, Eurasian Coot, Welcome Swallow, Little Raven and Starling.

Steve has been observing birds throughout the park for over 25 years.

A discussion with him focusing on the most significant birds that he has observed over the last twelve months includes, Wedge Tailed Eagle, Sea Eagle, Australasian Bittern, Wee Bill, Scarlet Robin, Little Eagle, Little Bitten, Musk Duck, Eastern Spine Bill, Scaly Breasted Lorikeet, Purple Crowned Lorikeet, Wood Sandpiper, Marsh Sandpiper, Flame Robin, Rufous Whistler, Nankeen Night Heron.



Steve has spotted and recorded over 220 species of bird at Braeside Park during his time observing.
